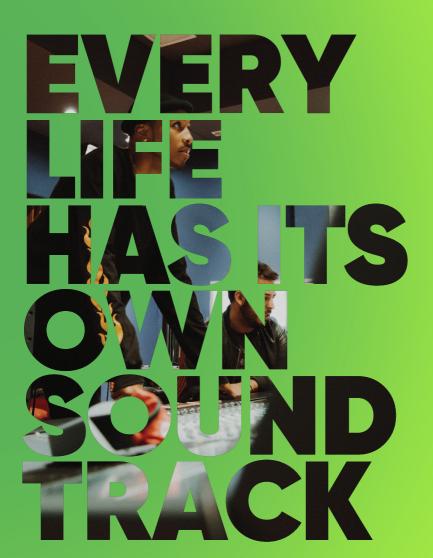

Areas of study include advanced recording in both analogue and digital landscapes, mixing, mastering techniques and spatial audio experiences for emerging technologies. Students will gain valuable insights from industry professionals on how to thrive in today's industry landscapes. The course encourages collaboration with other pathways, giving each student the opportunity to work alongside peers from other specialist areas of study.
